The club **Hall of Fame** has been added and if you have found and returned a item, then you need to have your picture and item added.

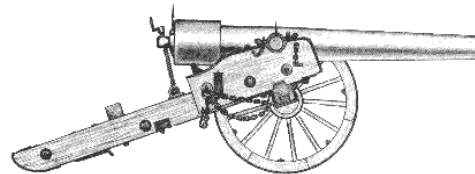
