Central Florida diver finds class ring, tracks down owner's family

Louise Hearst Entzminger probably figured her college class ring was gone for good after it fell to the bottom of a popular swimming hole near Longwood in the 1930s.

But now, almost 37 years after her death, Entzminger's gold ring — with a Mississippi Woman's College emblem on the outside and her maiden name inscribed on the inside — is in the hands of her 75-year-old grandson, thanks to the efforts of a determined scuba diver.

"It's a pretty amazing set of circumstances," said grandson John Entzminger of Oakton, Va. "I had absolutely no idea that my grandmother lost it."

Just as amazed is Reed Banjanin, who discovered the ring last summer while diving in the spring where she apparently lost it. He later tracked down her grandson.

"I've been diving for almost 20 years," Banjanin, 38, said, "and this is definitely the coolest thing I've ever found."

Banjanin lives in The Springs, which in the '30s was known as Sanlando Springs, a popular spot for bathers in what was then a rural area. Today, The Springs is a gated subdivision off busy State Road 434, and the swimming area is used only by residents and guests.

Last July, Banjanin was swimming about 25 feet below the surface in The Springs when his metal detector began chirping near an underwater cave. The AT&T electronics technician with an easygoing manner frequently scouts local springs and caves in search of hidden treasures.

"Usually it's just junk, but every once in a while I'll find an earring or something that I'm able to sell for a little money," he said.

Banjanin quickly started digging near the spot where his detector went off and found the gold ring shimmering in the sand.

"It was just in amazing condition," he said.

Using the Internet, Banjanin found that a Louise Hearst, the name inscribed on the ring, graduated with a bachelor's degree from the college in 1923, the date on the ring. He also learned that the woman, born in 1903, was from Hattiesburg, Miss. But Banjanin reached a dead end after that.

"I then set it aside and prayed, asking God to help me find the owner," Banjanin said. "I also put the information on Facebook."

It wasn't until last month, at the prodding of a friend, that Banjanin found a marriage record showing that in 1925, Louise Hearst married Robert S. Entzminger, who hailed from a well-known Seminole County family. His father was pastor of a Baptist church in Longwood, and his cousin was C.W. Entzminger, a prominent businessman, county commissioner and state legislator who helped develop Longwood in the early 20th century.

With help from Herman Durr, a South Carolina man who does ancestry research, Banjanin discovered that Louise Hearst Entzminger died in May 1975 and is buried in Blythewood, S.C.

Even though he wouldn't be able to return the ring to its original owner, Banjanin learned that her grandson, John Entzminger, was living in Virginia. Banjanin called Entzminger on Dec. 17 — his 75th birthday — to tell him about the discovery.

"I just couldn't believe it," said Entzminger, a retired engineer. "He traced me down."

Entzminger said his grandmother never mentioned losing the ring. He figures she may have gone swimming in Sanlando Springs in the mid-1930s on the day she lost it. Louise Entzminger was likely living in South Carolina at the time and probably was visiting her husband's family in Seminole County, her grandson said.

On Christmas Eve, Entzminger received his grandmother's ring in the mail from Banjanin. He said he plans to pass it on to his grandchildren as a family heirloom.

"It just is the most amazing of coincidences."
